Tumwater Middle School is located at 6335 Littlerock Road. The almost 80,000 square foot facility serves nearly 500 students in grades 7 and 8, with an administration/lunchroom/gymnasium building and two classroom buildings which house 26 classrooms. The front office provides an efficient area to serve students, parents, and visitors. In addition, musicians are enjoying the Music Learning Center, complete with practice rooms, office area, and a separate instrument storage room.

Students participate in six classes each day with an emphasis on core skill development: language arts, mathematics, science, social studies, and physical education/health classes. In addition, students choose from a variety of fine arts and exploratory classes including: band, choir, orchestra, art, leadership, science inquiry, robotics, and more. Students can receive academic support in reading, study skills, learning improvement, language arts and mathematics. More than half of our student body participates in our music

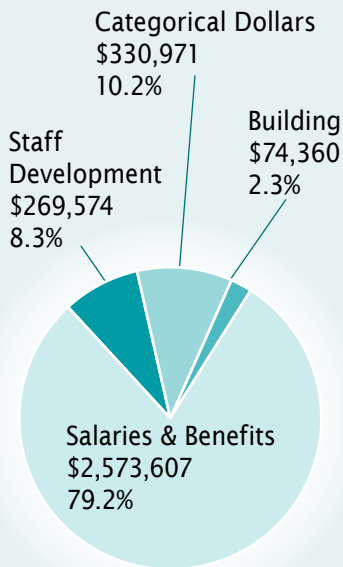
