10 Lessons From The Arts

- 1) In the arts we learn to make good judgments about relationships that are difficult, if not impossible, to measure. Unlike much of school, in which correct answers and enforced rules are a priority, it is reasonable and informed judgment that often prevails in the arts.
- 2) The arts remind us that problems can have more than one solution, and questions can have more than one answer.
- In the arts we celebrate and appreciate multiple perspectives.One of the arts' larger lessons is that there are many ways to see and interpret the world.
- 4) The arts reassure us it is okay when our original purpose for solving a problem changes with circumstances and opportunities. The arts require the ability and willingness to surrender to unanticipated possibilities as a project unfolds.
- 5) The arts remind us that we know far more than just words and numbers allow us to demonstrate. Our thinking exceeds our language.
- 6) The arts show how small differences can have major effects. The arts thrive in subtleties.
- 7) In the arts we think through and think within the possibilities of materials. All art forms employ some means through which our thoughts, feelings, values and beliefs are made real.
- 8) In the arts we learn to say what cannot be said. When people describe what a work of art makes them feel, they reach into their poetic capacities to find the words that will do the job.
- 9) The arts give us experiences we can have from no other source, and through such experiences we discover the range and variety of what we are capable of feeling.
- 10) The arts' position in our schools' and communities symbolizes to our children what adults believe is important.
