"Math - When am I ever going to use this?"

Do you recall asking that age-old question when you were in school? We find many of our students do and are helping to answer it. Mathematics is more than just number crunching; it is a way to make sense of the world we live in and can be exciting. That is why the A.G. West Black Hills High School (BHHS) Mathematics Department is implementing a new program. BHHS Math Teacher **Kristi Martin** is now offering Applied Mathematics 1, a course that started at the beginning of the 2019-20 school year. Students enrolled in this course learn a conceptual understanding of mathematical topics while working with experts in the field, completing hands-on activities and exploring the mathematics around us. The course was developed to focus on career-oriented

topics such as game design, coding, entrepreneurship, health and fitness, finances, statistics, construction, art and music.

Additionally, this course is equivalent to Integrated Mathematics 1 and allows students to earn their first year of high school mathematics credit or occupational education credit. With

the current 24-credit graduation requirement, taking Applied Mathematics 1 provides students with the opportunity to explore more electives and programs that are best aligned with their 13th year plan as it meets both an occupational education or first year mathematics requirement. BHHS freshman Liam Roberts is excited to be enrolled in this class and shares, "I like how this class is not just worksheets and long packets to work on followed by tests every week. I get to be involved in activities to learn the concepts. One of the things about the class that I have been surprised by is learning the research and graphing for certain projects. I will encourage friends to take this class because it's such a different learning experience."

Plans to expand the program include offering

Applied Mathematics II for all students who have earned the first year of high school mathematics credit. Dr. Martin welcomes community members to speak to the class and share how mathematics are used in varying career fields. An important part of my transition into the role of superintendent of Tumwater Schools has been taking time to listen to students, staff, parents, and community members to learn about our district's strengths and areas needing

attention or improvement. During this process, through Meet & Greet events, listening tour visits to schools, and personal conversations with community members, I have gathered verbal and written feedback from over 500 people. In this feedback, people identified many great strengths and areas of pride for our district, and I have also learned about opportunities for us to improve for the benefit of our students. I'd like to share with you a few of the key themes that have emerged.

First, it was not surprising to learn that our district has many reasons for celebration. The same qualities that drew me to Tumwater were constant themes people shared about our district. For example, people expressed that our district enjoys fantastic support from our parents and community. People also shared that TSD is fortunate to have high quality teachers and excellent staff across the District. In addition, our staff expressed optimism that we are moving in a positive direction with increased cooperation and listening between staff and leadership. Staff also shared a sincere appreciation for Academic Collaboration Time (ACT) on Friday afternoons, giving them critical time to work together with colleagues to improve instruction. They expressed this is a vital resource to support their work. Community members shared that they appreciate our district's work to keep students safe at school. It was encouraging to hear that our greatest strength is our people—we are fortunate to have great people teaching and supporting students in our community and in our schools.

Voter Information for the Feb. 11 Election

Proposition 1 – Replacement Educational Programs & Operations Levy (EP&O)

This local property tax helps the District pay for educational programs and operations costs that are not fully funded by the State. Currently, the levy provides approximately 12% of the District's budget.

Proposition 2 – Capital Facilities Levy

This helps the District perform much needed facility improvements and repairs to properly care for our buildings, improve safety and security measures, and foster innovation in technology.

On the February 11, 2020 ballot, Tumwater School District is asking our community to consider two local education funding measures that would allow the District to continue providing quality opportunities for all students as we prepare them for success in our schools and after graduation:

Prop. 1 – Replacement Educational Programs & Operations Levy (to be collected 2021-2024)

This levy allows us to maintain important District staffing and programs that our community has supported:

- Librarians, counselors, school nurses, paraeducators, custodians and safety personnel
- Career & Technical programs
- Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) programs
- Special Education
- Advanced Placement
- Arts, Music, Theater, Extracurricular Activities & Athletics
- The rate for the replacement EP&O levy is \$2.50 per \$1,000 of assessed property value to be collected 2021-2024 (replacing the current approved EP&O levy that ends in 2020) \$2.50 per \$1,000 of assessed property value.

Prop. 2 – Capital Facilities Levy (to be collected in 2021-2022)

This levy will provide our students and schools with \$10 million over two years:

- Improved safety and security across the District
- Technology enhancements for our students and staff
- Important facility improvements and repairs
- Pre Plan for the next Tumwater elementary school Estimated at \$.75 per \$1,000 of assessed property value.



Facilities Update: Your Bond Dollars at Work

The six years of capital-bond funded construction projects approved by voters in 2014 are nearly done. Long-term bonds totaling \$136 million along with \$20 million received from the State School Construction Assistance Program (SCAP) were used to fund much-needed new classrooms, replacement of old schools and renovations of existing schools. We also have used school impact fees from new housing permits for capacity-adding projects.

Projects that are in process or recently completed:

• The major renovation of Tumwater Hill Elementary is finished. It began with design in early 2017 and construction started in June 2018. After 18 months of construction, the school is new again. The old heating system, with electric furnaces above the classroom ceilings, was replaced with natural gas boilers pumping hot water to fan coil units housed outside the classroom walls for easy maintenance and guieter classrooms. All new lighting, new flooring, wall/ ceiling finishes, and interior changes to classrooms that enhance student learning are also complete. Safety improvements include a secure vestibule, lock-down buttons, new access control, security and fire alarm systems. Tumwater Hill was the last District facility without security cameras and now all sites have them.

- The new Tumwater Learning Center for high school education programs will be finished in early April. The District alternative high school, Secondary Options, and the LINCS program for special education will move into the new building in the summer. A naming committee recommended a name for the new building and new name for the alternative high school. These names, Tumwater Learning Center and Cascadia High School were approved by the School Board on December 12th.
- The fueling station upgrade at Support Services is finished and in use. A new diesel tank was

installed next to the existing diesel/gasoline tank, tripling our bus and maintenance fleet fuel capacity. This allows larger fuel deliveries at a lower cost per gallon. The new bus wash building is nearly finished and the wash equipment is being installed. We are collaborating with the City of Tumwater and LOTT for a Water Smart grant to pay for part of the water recycling equipment.

- The 40kW solar panel array on the roof of Peter G. Schmidt is in place and generating electricity. The array was made possible with grants from the TransAlta Centralia Coal Transition Board and the Washington State Department of Commerce. The savings on our power bill will amount to over \$8,000 per year. The District received a separate Department of Commerce Grant for District-wide energy savings projects including replacing the heating and ventilation system controls at Black Lake Elementary and Tumwater High School. The grant also replaces the head-end controls software our Support Services staff use to manage comfort and energy use over the entire 1,100,000 square feet of District buildings. This grant project should save \$50,000 in utility costs per year.
- Safety and Security projects for access control and visibility at the entries are completed at Black Lake Elementary, Michael T. Simmons Elementary, Black Hills High, and Tumwater High.
- The Black Hills High School Performing Arts
 Center (PAC) renovation is finished and re-opened to rave reviews for winter season orchestra, band and choir concerts. The quality of the new lighting and sound systems was especially well received.
- Tumwater High School Performing Arts Center: Refurbishment will start in late spring to renovate the seating, control booth and add dressing rooms, green room, theater director office and storage space for sets and costumes. Included in this project will be new lighting, audio and video.
- Tumwater District Stadium: Demolition is underway of the wood and fiberglass bleachers on the upper level of the District Stadium. After

all the old materials are removed, the concrete deck will be waterproofed and then new steel and aluminum bleachers will be built on top. This is scheduled to be complete before spring sports start.

Our bond projects over the past several years have greatly improved the facilities of our school district. We plan to establish a committee to prepare for future facility needs, including a new elementary school, and identify projects for a future bond ballot measure consistent with the Tumwater School District Capital Facilities Plan. Until then, we have several school safety and major maintenance projects that need immediate attention. For this reason, our Board approved a Capital Facilities Levy ballot measure in addition to a replacement EPO Levy, that will be voted on by our community in February. The capital funds will address the more critical needs for our facilities in order to keep our students warm, safe and dry.

All of the bond-funded projects recently completed or currently being worked on help improve and/or maintain the education, programs, and security for our students and staff. We sincerely thank the Tumwater community for your continued support of our students and schools!

excited about this pathway as it provides another perspective for students to explore mathematics. While learning the practical uses of mathematics, students build 21st Century Skills that include leadership, creativity, problem-solving, collaboration, and life/career skills.

Tumwater School District is committed to supporting all learners as they develop into young adults and is confident that this pathway provides additional opportunities while promoting options for mathematical success.

When asked what needs attention or improvement, people shared many different thoughts and ideas offering opportunities for growth. Specifically, staff members shared a belief that more counseling support is needed, particularly in schools with higher counselor-to-student ratios. Staff also expressed a belief that more paraeducator support is needed to assist students across our district. There was also interest in more District-wide collaboration and training regarding discipline practices to improve consistency and clarity, especially as we adjust to new discipline laws.

Another topic of frequent feedback from both staff and students is the grading policy (TSD Policy and Procedure 2420) that focuses 90% of academic grades on achievement as measured primarily by summative assessments, with other assignments and formative assessments making up no more than 10% of a student's grade. Staff and students expressed an interest in reviewing the policy and considering revisions to allow greater flexibility. In addition, parents, staff, and community members recommended that we seek ways to recruit a more diverse workforce that reflects the diversity of our community. Finally, staff and community members expressed an interest in reviewing our process for addressing student transfer requests in the District.

We are already acting on feedback received and will continue to use this information to guide our actions in the future. For example, a Transfer Work Group was formed to help the District update our processes for handling student transfer requests. We also formed teams of elementary and secondary staff to identify next steps to improve discipline practices. When the District has the financial capacity to do so, we will prioritize the addition of counselors, paraeducators, and support for mental health. These are just a few examples of how we are using the feedback you have shared to improve our district.

Thank you to those who have shared your thoughts and ideas about our district. We appreciate your interest in our schools, your constant support, and your feedback to help us keep improving. We will continue to reach out for your input, and we will continue to listen. Our mission in public schools is to provide the very best education possible for all of our students, and together we will keep that promise to our children.

I'd also like to remind you that Tumwater School District has two measures on the ballot for the February special election. First, the District is proposing renewal of our Educational Programs and Operations Levy that funds important staff and programs. Second, the District is proposing a Capital Facilities Levy to fund repairs, safety and security measures, technology, and planning for a future elementary school. You should have received information about these measures in the mail. You can also find information in this edition of *Open Line* on page 3.
